## AREA 3

Still waiting on Fall around here. This has been, to say the least, a different kind of season in Williams County. All is not lost as we have had some pretty decent weather for spraying. Staffing issues, technology issues and some alternative rain showers have made for a few difficult challenges to work through. I have been fielding some concerns from residents concerning un-washed oil field equipment being transported in and out of the County, and I agree with them. This can be a very difficult problem to address and I do not have a good answer. We are working on future plans for gravel hauling and development permits. We are on track to get the vast majority of our County/Township roads covered. Cost share has been popular and many residents are using Venue and really liking it. I had the opportunity in late spring to visit some of the local high school VO-AG classrooms and visit with them about what we do. These visits were well received. It's really hard to cuss the rain, so I won't, but we need a couple weeks yet to finish harvest around here. I'm excited about the fact that we are not in a draught stage right now!

Mountrail County Update-The number 1 issue in the county right now is the spread of weeds from aggregate. Well pads are spreading Absinth wormwood from the pads and encroaching onto the pasture lands and crop lands. Cheap gravel is cheap gravel! When we deal with poor contractors who are spreading dirty gravel, we end up cleaning up their mess. Spurge has been a tough nut to crack this year. Its getting to the point that we are losing ground with the spurge. Tordon is less effective and we don't have a label on the Method / TruRange yet. Leafy spurge had a second wave in July after the rains and we saw flushes come late in the season. A wormwood is getting to be more of a problem with the soil disturbance issue in the oilfield. In addition there are the Western Dakota counties working on a gravel program to get a lot of these gravel pits cleaned up and taking care of their weed issues. More to come in the near future! Hounds Tongue is really coming on hard this fall, spring inspections didn't yield a lot of concern. Fall will be busy trying to get it sprayed before fall freeze up.

Ward County -We hired one contractor and 2 employees along with myself doing the spraying. Hired a helicopter contractor to spray our gravel pits and on private land. On the private land we used Tordon at 32oz per acre with High Noon at 16 oz. per acre and in the gravel pits we used Method. When we were finished we covered just about 1,700 acres of pasture and gravel pits. Finding many smaller patches of Yellow Toadflax around the county. Hitting these patches with the Tordon/High Noon mix or using Method where possible. Sprayed for Purple Loosestrife along the Souris River again. Still finding plants scattered outside of city where drainages go to river. Spotted Knapweed is still giving us trouble in the same areas. Purchased, through the NDDA Biological Grant, weevils for the control of Spotted Knapweed, we have been spraying Leafy Spurge, Canada Thistle and Wormwood within the city of Minot with more complaints because of developers not controlling their weeds.

## AREA 4

**Emmons/Logan County:** We had a good spraying season so far this year, with very little interruptions due to weather. Our crews managed to cover all our DOT contracted roads along with McIntosh county faster than last year with the addition of a new pickup and sprayer to cover more ground in less time. Allowing us to spend more time on some areas that do not get traveled as frequently and scouting. Private spraying we still are getting in with the warmer temps this fall, as pasture work was slower this year due to the rain making them wetter or creeks impassable. Though we hope to finish a couple more of the larger ones we have in Emmons county before the end of the season. Water Hemlock was talked about in my counties with all the moisture that both counties had, in Emmons, it is in the process of getting put on the county weed list, to help with cost sharing for land owners wanting to control it. We upgraded to SpraySync for our data logging in our road sprayers this year, and it has been nice to be able to see where the crews are working in real time.

# NDWCA INDUSTRY REPORT

While 2,4-D products, ester and amine formulations and most all products that contain 2,4-D products did take drastic price increases earlier this year, these now have seemed to stable off, while they have not decreased in pricing they have not increase over the past coupe of months, earlier increases were blamed on tariffs and a law suit brought by a US company against off-shore 2,4-D products, the rumor is we might see some very slight price drops in the coming months, very slight.

Still expect to see your distributors/suppliers having pricing in the high teens to low \$20.00 plus for amines and 2,4-D esters (6 lb.) esters in the \$34.00 to \$38.00 ranges.

Glyphosate products are again showing a 4% to 6% increase on top of the earlier 10% to 12% increase since March 2025, these are not expected to drop soon and again, tariffs on the offshore tech and completed products are the major blame.

By the companies.

**ENVU** - Has no planned price increases at this time, they will normally take increases after the first of the new year (2026) if they do, Method 240 SL Herbicide may be the only product they have mentioned at this time that might get a price increase.

**CORTEVA** – Currently has not come forward with any new price increases since their May 29, 2025 increases, their intent was to possibly try and hold pricing at the Jue price increases for the 2025/2026 season, normally they have new pricing out by now to take effect October 1, 2025 and to date we have seen none so this might be where they are at, all pricing stated below is currently accurate as of June 16, 2025 for all stewardship products (manufacturer price set products).

All nonmanufacturer price set products did get the increase as of June 2, 2025, all manufacturer price set products will take the increases stated below on June 16, 2025, there will be no exceptions according to CORTEVA and your distributor/Supplier will have to follow the new stewardship pricing as of June 16, 2025.

<b>Freelexx Herbicide</b>	2.5, 30 and 250 gal. cont., \$35.00 per gallon
<b>HighNoon Herbicide</b>	1 & 2.5 gal. cont., \$98.00 per gallon, 250 gal. tote, \$96.00 per gallon
<b>Opensight Herbicide</b>	1.25 and 10 lb. cont., \$105.50 per pound
<b>Piper EZ Herbicide</b>	2.5 gal. cont. \$351.00 per gallon

Other products such as Tordon 22K Herbicide up 3%, Grazon PD3 Herbicide up 4.1%, Grazon Next HL Herbicide up 4.2%, Transline Herbicide up 3.1%, Garlon 3A up 3.7%, Garlon 4 Ultra up 4.1%, Vista XRT up 3.4% and again, all other CORTEVA products have price increases.

**Nichino** – Has announced that they will launch Pimlico Herbicide for 2026, this will replace Venue Herbicide in our markets, it will have the non-crop labeling, Pimlico Herbicide will be a 2x strength product and use rates will be basically 1/2 the Venue use rates per acre, regular Venue Herbicide will be discontinued once out of stock and all product will be switched to Pimlico Herbicide, cost was not available at this time on the Pimlico Herbicide

**Alligare** – Took price increases on May 1, 2025 and this has not changed, they averaged 10% overall on all of their products that would include, Diuron products, Panoramic 2SL (generic Plateau), Whetstone, Alligare 2,4-D amine and Ester (higher than 10% increases), Imazapyr products, triclopyr products and picloram products.

**BASF** – Again, has currently had no price increases on their products, these would include Plateau Herbicide, Arsenal Herbicide and other Imazapyr products, Frequency, Detail and other products, BASF will normally do any price increases after the first of the new year (2026) if they do.

**NuFarm** – has been taking price increases on their products throughout the year (2025) and the larger increases have been on their 2,4-D's or products containing 2,4-D's, these started last fall with the bigger increases coming after January 1, 2025, Products like E-2 Herbicide is currently \$64.05 per gallon which is one of the bigger used products from them, AquaNeat Herbicide (aquatic labeled glyphosate) increased about 7% earlier and has now taken about another 8% increase, this is in line with other glyphosate products.

# NDWCA INDUSTRY REPORT CONTINUED

**Bayer** - Which is the major glyphosate supplier in the US and worldwide has actually only taken about a 4% increase so far on their products, this is the VM and Turf and Ornamental lines of their products, but this will follow through into the Ag markets as well

Many other companies such as **Albaugh** (large in glyphosate production), **Drexel Chemical Company**, **SePro** (large in aquatic products) all have averaged 2% to 10% across the board on all products they produce, and almost all other manufacturers, have all also taken price increases due to mostly packaging increased costs and still, tariff uncertainty at this time.

**Surfactants and adjuvant products** – We are now seeing and have been informed that these will increase from about 3% to as high as 7% on some of the specialty adjuvant products, in most cases the surfactants and water conditioners are showing only a 3% increase or less, these have been attributed to some slight material costs and packaging costs (bottles, caps, boxes, etc..)

## Noxious Weeds Update from North Dakota Department of Agriculture

LAP and TAG Notice of Grant Awards were sent out to county contacts at the beginning of August.

During the last legislative session, an additional \$366,900 was appropriated and distributed between the LAP and TAG programs.

Of that amount:

- **\$234,400** was added to the **LAP allocation formula** and distributed among qualifying counties.

**TAG funding** was increased from **\$7,500 to \$10,000 per county**, with an additional **\$2,500** allocated to city weed boards.

As of now, I am still waiting to receive signed TAG NOGAs from 14 counties and signed LAP NOGAs from 5 counties.

\*Please note that **reimbursements cannot be requested or processed** until the signed Notice of Grant Award has been received.

Federal funding is available through NDDA, and the department strongly encourages counties to take advantage of this opportunity by applying for these funds.
